

## GOYT VALLEY STRIDERS CHARITY FUN RUN

## WHERE ARE THEY NOW ? OR

A few of us run because we say we enjoy it. Then one Sunday morning sitting in your car at a road junction for two hours waiting for the Tunstead Milton 2½ KM Fun Run to pass, you notice that some of the runners are older, fatter and even more decrepit than yourself and you think "I can do that".

Two weeks later you've crawled round the Otter ½ and know that you can't. But of course, it's too late, you've "raced". You're an athlete. You've become competitive. Next time you want to be 427th instead of 689th.

Then one day you enter the "BIG RACE". You know its a "BIG RACE" because there's a programme. Who can resist seeing their name in print? You buy one and go through the list of runners to find yourself. But what's this ? Steve Adonis and Gloria De Milo are running and they're <u>REAL</u> runners. Didn't he come 16th in the Heatons last year ? And wasn't she 4th Lady in the Marple 7 only last month ?

And now there's a new dimension to your running — to be able to feel you're joined in mutual enjoyment if not actual competition with your idols, by actually being in, sharing in the same race. The "I was there" syndrome emerges.

BUT performances at the top level are stabilising. In fact because of drug testing some falling off has been noticed. WHEREAS performances of "new breed" runners (being a Vet. I love that term) are still improving. Are there now the slightest signs that the so called "Elite" are beginning to look over their drooping shoulders? Is the Reebok now moving over to the other foot ? I believe so.

## CASE HISTORY - INGRID CHRISTIANSEN:

Multi-World record holder over various distances. Ran the London in 1987. There were several runners between us in the actual race but in the Hotel Reception the day before she couldn't have been more than 5 or 6 yards away. But where is she now? I know pregnancy and childbirth demand a break in training but I've been off longer with plantar fasciitis.

# CASE HISTORY - PAUL DAVIES-HALE:

Winner of the Chicago Marathon in 1990 and of the Stafford 20 a few weeks later just a stride or two in front of Ralph, Martin, Sue and myself, but failed to turn up in the London last year or this and little has been seen of him since on the Derbyshire/Cheshire running scene.

## CASE HISTORY - RITA BANKS

Womens World record holder for the number of marathons - 52 in 52 weeks in 1990. Rita ran the Leek 4 in June last year with several of us from the Striders. One or two of us beat her and I'm sure the fact that she ran marathons on the week-ends either side of

this mid—week evening race, had no bearing on the results at all. And where is she now?

# CASE HISTORY - BELAYNEH DINSAMO (ETHIOPIA)

World Marathon record holder (2:06:50 in Rotterdam) but failed to finish (unlike several Striders) in last years London. Apparently he wanted to stop in bed anyway instead of running (didn't we all!) Has won minor races since but where was he in January this year when Chris and myself were taking on the hills of Ripley in the Butterley Brick Half Marathon?

# CASE HISTORY - BRENDAN FOSTER:

Olympian/T.V. Commentator extraordinaire. Also ran well in the '88 Great North Run, finishing only a couple of minutes in front of yours truly. Also in the race were the Great Dane Lasse Viren and an up and coming local lad I didn't know at the time (ignorance is bliss someone said) — the then young and handsome Lou Lomas — now only a few years later, a running legend in Horwich End, New Mills and Bollington.

# CASE HISTORY - RON HILL:

Commonwealth Marathon Gold Medallist. Beat me in the '85 Stockport Marathon and the better known Unit 33 Charities 6 at Rochdale the same year, where the nearest I got to him was the adjacent bay in the Gents, just before the race. But where is he now ? He's avoided me ever since with excuses such as knee operations (several), broken arm and others too pathetic to mention.

# CASE HISTORY - HIROMI TANIGUCHI (JAPAN)

London Marathon winner in '87 and Rotterdam since. Another foreigner who beat me to the line in '87 but where was he last August when I was doing the Bidduiph 7, or in September for the NES Altrincham 5 or in February this year for the Werneth Low run — nor did he turn up in London for a re—match this year. It's the Coe—Ovett scenario all over again.

# CASE HISTORY - DAVE LEWIS:

National XC Champion '85 and '89. Winner of the Robin Hood Half Marathon at Nottingham last year when I had a less than satisfactory run. Has had some little successes since and is supposedly still running at the highest level, but obviously not as high as Werneth Low - another who failed to show at Romiley C.C. this year.
